WHAT YOU WERE AFRAID TO ASK ABOUT PTSD

Dr. Tom Berger, a Vietnam veteran as a navy corpsman with the Marines in Vietnam during 1966 to 1968, will discuss the basic causes and symptoms of PTSD and treatment at the November 19th membership meeting. He is a Life VVA member and currently the Executive Director of VVA's Veteran Health Council and chairman of VVA's PTSD and Substance Abuse Committee. Tom is a recognized PTSD expert, and he serves on several national and DVA health and mental commissions.

All members and spouses are encouraged to learn about this debilitating mental illness on military veterans. If you know of a current family whose loved one has recently experienced combat, “do” invite them to the meeting. It may be a life saving act of kindness.

Announce the *Vince Kaspar Prizes* *for Excellence in the Arts*

The 2009-2010 academic year will be the 14th year of the Vince Kaspar Awards.

Two first prizes of \$200 will be awarded.

One First Prize will be awarded for a Poem of any length, style, or subject. Judges include professional writers from the sponsoring organizations.

One First Prize will be awarded for a work of Visual Art of any size or medium. Judges include professional artists from the local art community.

Second and third prizes in each category are \$100 and \$50.

Eligibility: All high school juniors and seniors who reside **or** attend school in Arlington and Fairfax counties, the Town of Vienna and the cities of Falls Church, Alexandria, and Fairfax.

Submission of Entries: Mail entries to the Vince Kaspar Prizes for Excellence in the Arts, c/o VVA Chapter 227, P.O. Box 5653, Arlington, Va., 22205. **For poetry**, please provide two copies of your work. To facilitate a "blind judging" put your *identifiers* of: Name, Address, Telephone Number, E-mail Address, School Attended, and whether a Junior or Senior, **on one copy only**. **For art**, you can submit one or two copies, but put your *identifiers* on a separate sheet of paper for each entry. Art entries may also be submitted via electronic medium, such as a CD or a DVD. Entries submitted electronically should have the identifier on the jewel case or a separate piece of paper, **not** on the electronic medium. *Failure to follow identifier instructions may disqualify your entry.*

Deadline: Postmarked no later than February 27, 2010. Prizes will be awarded at the VVA Chapter 227 meeting on Thursday, May 21, 2010. Poetry winners (including Honorable Mentions) will be asked to read their poetry at the ceremony. Winning artists will discuss their work and their entries will be displayed at the ceremony (and returned at that time.)

WHY VIETNAM MATTERS

As a young army 2nd Lt. and trained CIA operative, Rufus Phillips did not comprehend how his initial duty assignment to the Saigon Military Mission in 1954 would make him one of the early experts on understanding this conflict. He arrived just as the cease fire was taking effect that would divide Vietnam into two countries. He worked with Edward G. Lansdale to help the South Vietnamese government develop its political and military structure to defeat the Communists. After his military Tour of Duty, he worked as a civilian in several capacities that broadened his understanding of the conflict. His expertise was so well respected that he briefed President Kennedy on the war. He believed that the president realized that only the South Vietnamese could win the war.

The initial U.S. failure was to develop a political cause to compete with Communist nationalism, which led to the eventual decision to bring in U.S. troops to win the war for the Vietnamese with a WW II big battle strategy. The WWII strategy neglected the rural villagers and farmers, which is the heart of a successful insurgency. He claimed that General Abrams strategy to protect the rural villages was successful in winning the hearts and minds of these people in 1969 and 1970. The Vietnamization was doomed to fail since the Vietnamese military lacked an air force and logistics to support the program and its accelerated pace. Despite its many handicaps, battle tested ARVN commanders were able to defeat the communist 1972 Easter Offensive. The 1975 North Vietnam invasion was successful due to the drastic cut in U.S. military aid and our refusal to fulfill our pledge to respond to Communist aggression. His complete analysis is in his book, "Why Vietnam Matters".

Some of the negative lessons learned from the Vietnam War were:

1. An attitude of Western culture superiority
2. Use of WWII military tactics in a civil war
3. Failure to view the conflict through the eyes of the adversary
4. Ignoring our host country's culture and social history in order to build a relationship.
5. Failure to appreciate the impact of nationalism in a civil war
6. Working in a political environment in which the U.S. had never lost a war.
7. Ignoring the input from the troops and civilians in the field as to what was really happening
8. Telling the boss what he wanted to hear instead of the truth.

Based on a recent month long visit to Afghanistan, he believes little or no progress has been accomplished in the last seven years due to inadequate resources. He is optimistic that the conflict can be won if the mistakes of Vietnam are not repeated. He strongly recommends avoiding air strikes since they usually alienate the general population and innocent victims. Pakistan is a key player not to be ignored. The correct effort may take 3 to 5 years. His recent discussions with the troops and civilians in the field revealed that they have an understanding and knowledge to make the right decisions to win the hearts and minds of the people. It is going to take the political will of our leaders to make the right decision, and our support to win this war.

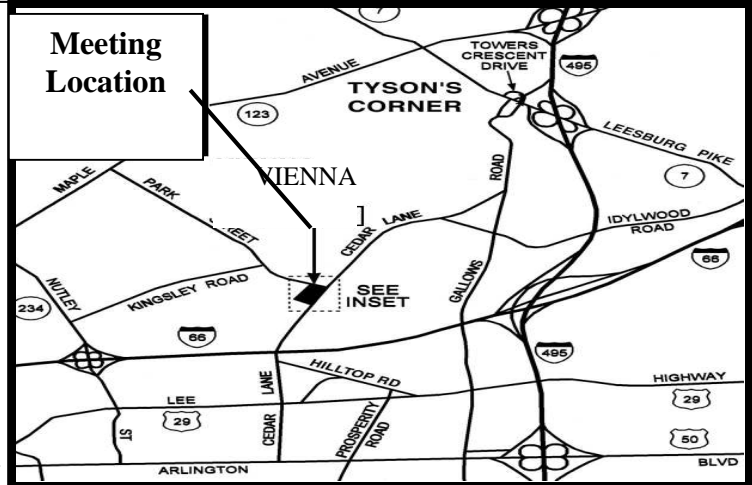

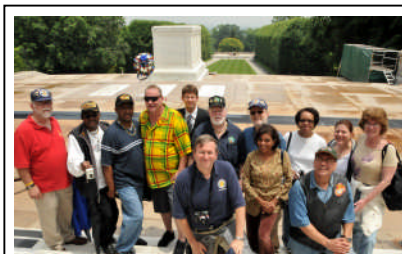
